I would like to thank Amy, AG7GP for putting together a fascinating presentation last month.

I would like to take a moment and give out a big high five to the YL operators of the past. Some of the names I have come across in my reading about the early days of ham radio (early 1900's) are:

Gladys Kathleen Parkin. At the age of 15 she received her ham radio license. She was on the cover of The Electrical Experimenter, and at that time was the youngest successful female ham radio license applicant. She began the hobby at the age of 5 and the first woman in California to receive a license, the first class radio

license callsign she was issued was 6SO

- There were many other women in the early stages of ham radio just as knowledgeable such as Gladys Graynella Packer, the youngest woman to become a wireless operator on a ocean going steamship,
- Olive Carroll earned her second class radio certificate in 1944.Later in her life she had the opportunity to take a position aboard a Norwegian passenger freighter.
- Another woman that stands out is Clara Reager. She received her call sign in 1933 at the age of 35. Some of her accomplishments were:
  - Teaching a 14 year old boy to send morse code with his feet, for which she received the Edison Award. One of the best things about Clara is that she created the CW prosing especially for women, the number "33", which meant "love sealed with friendship".

It was rare and special to hear another woman's voice on the other end of the radio .

The largest organization to date for YL ham operators in the world is the Young Ladie's Radio League,Inc.(YLRL).

Many thanks go out to the YL's of ham radio of the past and present, including our club's own Amy (AG7GP).

The first presentation on Portable Station Setups by Amy Haptonstall, AG7GP, commenced at 7:23pm.

Slides were presented of her recent station setups:

- 1. Ohms Rd. in the Dalles, OR during the last eclipse of the sun.
- 2. A Baker Island contest using an Icom 706Mk2G.
- Watts Rd., grid DN01, at the Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge, where she was getting about 100 contacts/hr on 40M at sundown. The Android App named GpsStatus was useful for grid square listings.
- Lower Klamath National Wildlife Refuge, grid CN91, which along with Sheldon NWR are part of the Parks On The Air program (POTA). (see parksontheair.com for details on that program.)

The second presentation commenced at 8:10pm, titled: Radio Contesting, Ideas For Improving Your Score by John Laybourne, AC7C.

#### Key points:

- Pick contests you like the most: Domestic (high Take-Off-Angle) or DX (low Take-Off-Angle) . Phone, CW, or Digital. Short, Medium, or Long Time Frame.
- Match your antenna to your contest.
- Consider becoming a single band expert.
- Which bands play best for you? ( given your antennas available, antenna gain & Take-Off-Angle, terrain, who you want to contact, etc. )
- Optimize antenna to the contest, for the DIY antenna makers.
- Have multiple antennas per band.
- Optimize shack for efficiency: good chair; good headphones or mic headset with foot-switch mounted on foot-rest; SWR/ Watt meter in direct view; PC, monitor, keyboard and table at correct height; keep log program and radio in sync; automate antenna switching; have good

lighting and ventilation.

- Keep up CQ rate. (better than search & pounce)
- Know the value of multipliers, and work the multipliers on that band.
- Don't leave a good CQ run.
- Turn in your logs.
- Practice, practice, practice.
